My dearest in the Lord

Wretched thing that I am, I shall not fail to continue to pray, wholeheartedly. God knows how greatly I am desirous of seeing you at peace. Also, make the adjustments in your promise to Maria SS.ma delle Canne, as you suggested to me, and let us be hopeful. Trust in Mary most holy and may there be peace in your heart.

After you have finished with the two small volumes written by the deceased Marquis Tani,<sup>2</sup> please do me the favor of returning them to me. Furthermore, have no doubt that, once the spring listing of Missions has been figured out, a companion will be coming there. In the meantime, prayers.

Likewise, I would like you to be assured of the will of God in regard to your vocation. Excessive fear causes agitation too, as one can readily imagine. Oh, my beloved friend, why become anxious as long as we are in the hands of God? Is he not a most loving Father? Does he not take care of us? Does he not dispose all things for our own good? He used Moses to humiliate Pharaoh and, in general, *infirma eligit, ut fortia quaeque confundat*.<sup>3</sup> When we use the 24 hours of the day for God, in the mystical bed of his will, we have done everything. This does not deny, however, the necessity of prayer and faith in God.<sup>4</sup> Even St. Bernardine of Siena was cured of hoarseness and the same can be said of so many others.

Keep sending me the notifications of the Masses. Be careful about antonino and take into account the clothing that he has already. I fear that he might be crafty in seeking something more. However, if you see an urgency for it, have some trousers made for him of black material and get it wherever you can.

You will have only the ones that are reserved on the list made by Msgr. Manassi; for anything more, from the Tridentine; you will have to send a petition for them.

At this point, after having undertaken several approaches, carried out in a prudent fashion and singularly blessed by God, I have solved the matter entrusted to me by the Holy Father with respect to Mr. Rosini. This fellow is only a very, very poor man, of mature age, burdened with a numerous offspring, and in such a state that I found it necessary to give him a bit of financial help for his subsistence. With candor he confessed having authored the anonymous writing, done however under the pressure of a desperate moment brought on by reason of the payments due for

loans on his house. In his anguish, he gave in to the excessive fault of writing in a most improper and uncivil way. However, since he is a man of basically good character, he has already admitted his error, has admired the virtue of his Holiness, and through me, now offers him his most humble apology. We can be very sure of his repentance, and I have experienced consolation in seeing him immediately prompt and candid in his confession of the truth. He has already received the holy Sacraments and, because he was fearful of something else happening to him, I assured him of the Sovereign's word. With an abundance of tears, he left me, promising to pray always for the long preservation of his Holiness. This is all that I have to communicate to you, and, most reverend excellency, asking you for your prayers and with the usual esteem and respect, I remain

I would say that you should pass through Terracina where, with the assistance of the bishop there, you will have them draw up your traveling papers for the Kingdom. You should get all of your faculties in Gaeta from the most reverend bishop to whom you will give the enclosed. Any other appointments that may be offered to you, you are to decline, saying in general that they should write to me to get workers and that you are occupied with other things in the line of the ministry. In my behalf, give my thanks to the most reverend Vicar. The income from the Lenten series in the respective locales is to be used to cover the expenses. You will be receiving that, and once the expenses are paid and you have also subtracted the traveling expenses, if there should be something left over, it should be given to the construction in Vallecorsa. Let us be united in

I understand all that you mention in your letter concerning Gaeta and I realize that the difficulties that have arisen for the bishop of Gaeta are due to certain prescriptions in the Kingdom which I think are being interpreted too literally. I also recognize the force of your reasoning and I will regulate my actions accordingly. I am pleased that our Congregation nourishes such basic principles that make the propagation of our devotion easier.

I have received the printed page dealing with suffrages, unlike anything that I have in my house. That means that I shall have them signed and passed on to you or they may be lost. However, since this matter of suffrages is such a delicate thing, I therefore ask that you give me a better explanation as to what my inspection involves so that I can be at peace in my own mind. I do not have a clear recollection of it. From the exposition on the page, it seems to me that all has a relationship to the Archconfraternity. After another letter from you, clarifying the matter, we will have a more precise understanding .

You probably have taken care of the suffrages for our deceased very dear Achille.

Most venerable and beloved Monsignor

With pleasure did I receive your most appreciated letter and in reply I say to you that the month of May is entirely taken up by appointments to the seminary of Sezze, to Maenza, to the nuns in Piperno, to the clergy in Arpino and by a trip that I will have to make to Sezze for a visitation of Cardinal Ercolani's monastery from which I am unable to be excused. Add to this the Missions to be conducted in the dioceses of Marsi, Sora, Todi, Rieti, and Norcia, along with the months of the most holy Mary in the respective Houses, and finally the sending of Canon Carboneri to Atri and Penne with Father Luigi Mosconi and Father Emidio Bellini who will complete the tour of that diocese. This listing will help the zealous pastor of Monticelli to realize that if he had written to me in time, I would have shown him preference since we favor those dioceses where we have foundations. So it is necessity, not my own free choice, that determines my writing to you in this way. But this can serve also as a reminder to your exercise of charity by offering prayers.

You could suggest a couple of plans. First, (and this could be taken care of absolutely) that you yourself go there with Canon Locatelli and restore the spirit of the last Mission; perhaps that is why providence has disposed that the request should be addressed to you. Second, that a different time be selected, excluding May and June. After our solemn observance of the months and the completion of spring Missions, two Missionaries will be available.

But why leave the souls in need when you, in a few days, can be influential in achieving a great good? With you going there, I personally would experience the deepest satisfaction. Recommend me often to God; take good care of your health, and do not overdo it. A forced good work can impede a greater good that is done with order, except when there is an extraordinary inspiration from God. Venerable Monsignor

Oh how delighted I was to receive the news concerning your health which I hope will prosper for many long years, full of merits for blessed eternity. Do not cease to preserve it by not overworking too much.

The paragraph in my recent letter, in which I did not express myself well, pertains to the chapels in the prisons in the Kingdom of Naples. It is a matter that has probably been overlooked due to the death of King Ferdinand. I suggested, therefore, that at least provisionally the portable altar could afford the opportunity for religious and christian services.

I must now ask you to petition his Holiness to be kind enough to grant to all of our Missionaries the faculty of being able to gain the jubilee indulgence by visiting our churches thirty times, since we cannot leave our Houses nor interrupt our Missions and Retreats as well as other things incumbent upon the Institute. Our Houses are open Missions; our workers have a choice in our ministry and hence are always busy. You, in your wisdom, know that it is to the greater glory of God to look after what I have referred to here; also, because we do not have a House in Rome, as do the other Institutes, where our men would be able to make a livelihood (in addition, in general, to covering the expenses incurred in traveling) etc. etc. I know that the Holy Father is quite wise and has granted this privilege to others for just reasons. It is enough for me that you express your sentiments, which you can then communicate to me, and we shall not fail to pray especially for his Beatitude and for your most reverend excellency, our most beloved father. In behalf of the Society, I ask that you please petition for the same privilege for the benefit of our Brothers in service in our Houses, for our students in Giano and Sermoneta, where in addition to their hospice they are also dwelling in the large convent formerly belonging to the Reformed, and the young men in that locale who are enjoying peace and quiet.

As for the pictures, engravings, miniatures and other lascivious items, the Holy Father has probably provided for in his Encyclical to the bishops etc. As for any other of our problems, *ad alias*.<sup>17</sup>

P. S. A brief time ago, a Marchese dei Marzii came to me and urged me to recommend to your most reverend excellency a Major Clino Ferrari of Ceprano who has requested that he be the successor to his deceased father in the most honorable as well as lucrative position of Superintendent of the Customs. I very forcefully showed him that I did not wish to be involved in this, for I am quite aware of my nothingness, but then, seeing him distressed by my rejection, I felt that I should not deny him and so I promised him that I would recommend him, as I am presently doing, also because of the good reports that I have heard concerning him, to the consideration of your most reverend excellency, declaring always my incapability of doing anything. Offer suffrages for the soul of an excellent, young Brother of ours who has died. *Haec est magna cogitatio*.<sup>18</sup>

With this letter I am asking you for your opinion, that is, whether you deem it expedient for me to send a letter to Mr. Lovatti, asking him not to delay making the payment, which you know about.

I hope that you have concluded the Bedoni affair, as far as the Hospital is concerned. With holy impatience I am awaiting the data on Msgr. Albertini, since I already have someone who will write the Life. You are too busy. I have already written with regard to the person who will conduct our Month. I am not thinking about the Octave; but, later on, for the decorum of the Society which redounds to the glory of God, we will have to reserve this, too, for a Missionary of ours. At any rate, this year I have fully aligned myself with your sentiments, and the purpose that you have in mind is a saintly one. I hope, however, that later the suggestion made above will not be displeasing to you. You will be able to think about it deeply at the foot of the Crucified.

Whenever you can get hold of any printed matter for the Missions, always do me the

favor of passing them on to Severini, keeping in mind anything else that pertains to the good advancement of things.

As for my doubts concerning the suffrages in behalf of contributors, whose number you will try to increase, since I have not gotten an answer to my questions, I am not doing anything further about it. To put it briefly, I have the matter before me in general, but I do not recall it in detail, nor would I want to overlook anything.

Given the chance, if you have a suggestion to make to me about some particular locale suitable for us, we will come to an understanding. Do not fail to write to me about it, for in the multitude of business matters which keep increasing, I find it urgently necessary to put someone in Rome who can be installed there for our group, and who will take care of the office of Procurator of our Houses. Little by little everything will be consolidated.

Fr. Giovanni Merlini tells me that you are displeased with me because I do not keep you informed of everything. I can assure you, not only do I want to keep you up to date on everything because I love and esteem you in Jesus Christ, but also I would like to add to your responsibilities the General Direction of the Institute, since I am a lover of obeying and not of presiding. You know that we are not destined to remain here on earth forever. Hence, others will follow us. That is why it is necessary now to set up the principles, worked out together, for the good government of the Society in general and of its various ramifications. I have been so busy with the work of the Institute that I have not been able to maintain the letterwriting in which I could make known (God willing) that more is accomplished by the work of others than by our own. So, I limit myself to a specific need. Besides, I prefer talking with God about the good than with men.

But then you will say: "I am the one that they question". Well, in that case you can answer that they should have recourse to me. Furthermore, it is always possible for them to write to me on occasion, requesting information on whatever could be needed for the greater glory of God. I cannot be aware of all that is demanded in Rome and of all the gossip that can arise. Nor can I refute them, if I do not know about them. So, unless I am given an extraordinary gift from God, I will not be able to prevent it.

In general, I tell you that the Society is going along very well, that the members are increasing in number and all is being carried out according to the principles of our Founder. Oh, how I would like to see someone produce a portrait of him.

Let us remain in the most holy wounds of Jesus Christ. Let us grow in fervor during the coming Month. Jesus be with us. And with the desire to embrace you once again before the end of the Holy Year, I am and will constantly be with fullness of esteem and constant special attachment of you, venerable Monsignor

I inconvenience you with this most humble letter of mine to ask you for a bit of particular financial help of which, at the present time, I am extremely needful. The sickness and death of our excellent Father Luigi Achille, as well as that of our good, young Brother, together with postal expenses that are increasing, devotional materials that, even with parsimony, are necessarily shared with my companions, not to mention a lot of other things, at the present time are causing me considerable anguish. My Monsignor, even though I could spare myself from writing to you, nevertheless I do so, and God knows how sorry I am to give you this trouble. I pray to the Lord that he grant me the favor to see well-established the Society which, through his divine mercy, is setting evermore deeper roots. For me, the expenses increase with the increase of membership, but you can be assured that we pay close attention to the strictest economy. Indeed, I think that sometimes God is working miracles since not even I know how we keep making progress. You do a great deal, a very great deal, but you can be assured that poor and abandoned churches have been located, countless needy people have been contacted, sacred functions have been maintained, food, clothing and beds provided, etc. etc. and this is a sea of activity. Among certain peoples, the poverty is such that, during the Missions it is up to us to provide for many things, otherwise we could not carry out the necessary education.

Presently, the heirs of Father Luigi Achille are repeating the donations that he himself had offered for the construction work in Giano, hopeful that those backpayments would be forthcoming. My Monsignor, that is a point of justice, not just a favor. If the Holy Father thinks that he should show favor to the schools, he should provide us with a compensation. In Albano, I

am faced with the final payments of the debts incurred in the construction there and I do not know how I will be able to do that. Also, there, why doesn't the Datary give a compensation to the chapter and to the seminary, as well as to grant to us the goods assigned by Onorio? If brigandry is quieted down, could we not open Terracina (where each year I send extraordinary encouragements) to help run Albano?

In my own poor heart, I love the crosses upon which the works of God are brought forth; and, while they are consoling on the spiritual level, they open the way to the practice of special virtues on the temporal level. Without realizing it, I have already written too much. The King of Naples, after a meeting with the bishop of Gaeta, has shown a great interest in our Society etc. I foresee a great work that will be developing from this. If one were to see the beautiful regulations for our boarding schools, oh how much more would one see the designs of providence! My Monsignor, may the Lord fill you with every blessing. You are the instrument which God utilizes for governing our Institute. I am fearful that my own demerits impede even greater blessings. Pray a lot, a lot for me, as I remain constantly

Dear Canon<sup>23</sup>

I am enclosing what I have been able to put together for the glories of the Divine Blood. You should please return to me all of the pages which you have gathered on your own, relative to our important objectives; since you do not ever seem to find time to write; they could supply a bit of inspiration for someone else. Let us agree on this: this is the will of God.

Merlini is presently checking the circular; then I will look it over.

With regard to Angelo, relative to clothing, I have authorized him in a recent letter of mine.

I knew nothing about Zapponi who may have been argumentative. With regard to this, for the time being, it would be more helpful, in my opinion, to be silent and ignore it. Only you, who know him, might tell him that he should instruct himself, inform himself and, in short, depend etc.

Also, on this question, let us be in agreement. I, however, theoretically speaking, do not approve such things except for our students in the gatherings etc.

With respect to the question you asked concerning the letters of St. Paul which so frequently name Jesus, I can only say to you that often he uses *in nomine Jesu*<sup>24</sup> to indicate the hypostatic union etc. *In nomine* refers to the unity of the divine essence, for Jesus is the only Son of the divine Father, consubstantial to the Father etc. But taking into account the prodigy of love etc, etc. Jesus means *Redeemer* and herein lies the totality of the mysteries of grace. In the Church's exordiums (and we always must also point out the *why* we have been redeemed etc.) the apostle explains the efficacy of the name of Jesus and says: *in nomine Iesu omne genuflectatur caelestium, etc.*<sup>25</sup> But already in these words one can see by what means one can say *omne genuflectatur etc.* Scripture is to be taken in a comprehensive sense, otherwise how can one explain the text: *Non qui dixerit domine domine hic salvus erit?*<sup>26</sup> In the exordiums of the Church, one must make Jesus known but inseparably from his efficacy as Redeemer. Nowadays, when so many freethinkers have spoken of religion etc. have set up the crucifix and have said one must believe in Jesus etc. etc. while they still persecute him etc., one must rather be more insistent on the true and unmistakable application of redemption. So, therefore, it is not good simply to say I believe in Jesus; I have contaminated my heart etc.; in this application, one

should more explicitly insist on merits since this has always been recognized as the means etc. etc.

In the exordiums of the Church, *Jesus erat Judeis scandalum. gentibus stultitiam, etc. etc.*<sup>27</sup> In our times, with manifest abuse, the name of Jesus is spoken, and meanwhile, etc. So, therefore, *si ego Dominus ubi est honor meus?*<sup>28</sup> Since Jesus loved to show mercy, he says, if by scandal so many souls have been contaminated, then grant, through the divine Blood, that they be won back etc.

Dear Canon, through study and prayer, you should refine the ideas which I do not know whether I have developed well or not. I conclude by saying the to utter the name Jesus is to make known the *dignitas Redemptoris*<sup>29</sup>... by referring to the Blood of Jesus Christ is to make known the *dignitas Redemptionis...ad efficaciam Nominis et ad applicationem Redemptionis (fide jam dilatata) praecipue est insistendum hodierna die.*<sup>30</sup>

I have seen Bartolomeo's picture, and he sends you his greetings. Take care of yourself. Pray, and have others pray for me. I shall arrange for your return to Rome and have you find there on the desk a packet of letters which you are to take care of in Rome, where you will be, at the latest, on June 1st. *Orate.*<sup>31</sup>

Your Eminence

There are several things that I must report to you concerning the Monastery of the Sacred Family in Sezze <sup>36</sup> and of these I will gradually make them known to you. However, in the meantime, these are the most urgent.

A temporary confessor has been located in the person of a certain Canon Sari, a worker in the nightly oratory, erected for the men in Sezze on the occasion of the recent Mission there. He is a middleaged man and appears to me to be happy with this, as you will probably learn also from the archdeacon who told me that he would be coming to Rome within a short time. As extraordinary director, in addition to the ones already approved by your most reverend Eminence, Canon Biagio la Penna, the rector of the seminary in Sezze, has been approved. He is a very pious man and, I am told, he is 38 years of age.

With regard to Masses and pious legacies, following my last visitation, I thought that everything had been settled, but perhaps because of the absence of your Eminence from Rome during the past year, the letters may have been lost. Whatever course the situation may have taken, now it is necessary to review the matter itself which is very important in every detail.

The Monastery has several obligations of Masses, in addition to one or two daily Mass chaplaincies. This is something that Archdeacon la Galla will be able to explain better to you. With regard to the booking of Masses, I have found only one, as far as I can recall at present. Surely, the older ones will not be found and, I believe, they were lost during the recent upheavals. A few rescripts of sanation and composition are found. Furthermore, in view of the death of the recent superior, who was wellinformed about all this, one can scarcely discover any order in things helpful for a definitive examination of the problem. The Archives are being put in order since last year, but since the archivist became ill, the work has been delayed. Therefore, in my subjective opinion, your Eminence, either in person or by written petition, should ask his Holiness to grant a general relief to these poor religious women and do so in the broadest terms,

covering any obligation incumbent, even for temporary Masses, on any altar even a privileged one, or any set date, and even in any church. Thus the nuns will be at peace concerning everything. The investigation that one would like to undertake is, under the circumstances, not manageable.

For the future, then, your most reverend Eminence might petition that the one daily Mass should comprehensively cover the entire situation, at least for a period of three years, in harmony with the nuns' desire to be occupied entirely in their work, to gradually set the monastery in order so that, with every obligation lifted, they can return gradually to the pursuit of their life of perfection in common. The good work that this Institute promotes is inexpressible. The very labors that they undergo for the glory of God should encourage the Holy Father to condescend to grant what is being requested. The zeal of your most reverend Eminence will also be joined with all your other special merits. For now, I shall not say anything further concerning the visitation.

With regard to your seminary in S. Salvator Maggiore, God knows what disappointment I experienced during the past year. This year, however, I hope that new problems will not arise. I assure you that, except for a sickness that may arise or because of a Mission which the Holy Father asks me to handle, I shall go there. And if one or the other impediment should occur, I promise you that I will send one of my companions, capable and experienced in that line of work in other seminaries, with the Lord accompanying them with his special blessings. In this way, your most reverend Eminence, in every respect, can remain at ease. However, I would like the young men to be informed that the retreat will begin between the 9th or, at the latest, the 10th of November.

Canon Giusti of Piperno, from whom I sent you a memorandum, is, as I have learned, a covisitor for the bishop of Terracina who is presently in Rome, and, with the restoration of the Succolletoria, has assisted the present subcollector.

I would like to have news concerning your health which is so very close to my heart and for which I do not cease praying. Also, if you so wish it, I myself will include a petition to the Holy Father with regard to the Mass situation in your monastery, at only a word from you, and then your Eminence would do the favor of presenting it to the Holy Father, hopeful of a successful result.

I kiss the sacred purple. Pray especially for me who has the honor, most reverend Eminence, of declaring again with profound homage and esteem that I am

As a safeguard I inform you that the painting of St. Xavier is already in the Mission House in Frosinone. Now it is necessary that the brethren see to its transportation. I have written to the Rector of the seminary in the event that the most reverend bishop might be interested in its

being moved, since he himself is deeply devoted to the Saint. This is for your information, if necessary. The 10 ducats should be deposited with the Rector of the seminary, Father Luigi Grossi, in Gaeta, and I have already sent him word. Any further amount, I shall contribute myself.

I have already sent a reply with regard to the Masses forwarded to me by Father Filippo Cinquanta.

I renew my gratitude to you and once again I point out that what I made known concerning the works of Metastasio referred certainly to the lovepoems etc. which he himself later would have liked to retract. One notes that he acted with little sagacity. There are, however, the sacred writings which the author put out in compensation for the profane ones. It would be a better idea if you were to consult with a person who is knowledgeable and versed in this matter if you need to have further counsel.

The other halfsheet is missing because I removed it since it came delivered to me by hand and they made it quite unpresentable. Four more bishops in the Kingdom have made the same request. If you think it is a good idea to make this known to his Holiness, you make that decision. Furthermore, I know that when the King of Naples was passing through Mola di Gaeta, the bishop met with him, purposely having an interesting discussion with him on this matter, and, we hope that it was a fruitful one.

I am also enclosing a memorandum which, it seems to me, might meet with your kind treatment. The most eminent Cardinal Ercolani is the Protector of the Monastery sending this request. However, his health has prevented him from being of assistance to them as he would like to do and he has entrusted their care to my insufficiency. It is an institute that takes care of schools, education, first communions, retreats for women. It is very involved in giving glory to God.

Since the time that we got together in Piperno; I have not had any message by mail from you. act accordingly.

When I learned that you were not pleased with Paolo from Sermoneta as a Brother, I decided to send you one who is altogether new. You will train him *iuxta regulas*.<sup>42</sup> I am awaiting his arrival any one of these days; and I shall send him on immediately.

As a reward for Sig. Antonio, whom I revere, tell him that I have already written to Rome to locate another painting of St. Xavier. In that way they can send back the one that was in the chapel of the Pellegrini house, which was my own property. Also, thank him for me for the assistance that he is giving you at the present time.

In reference to the hay crop, tell the Brothers that each one of them is to be ready to make sacrifices for the time being. With an eager charity one can do twice as much.

Enclosed is the Jubilee Indulgence.<sup>43</sup> It was granted secretly by His Holiness, so that you, as well as the other Missionaries *residenti tantum*,<sup>44</sup> and permanently in the House of Studies, can gain them. You are to visit our church 30 times, praying for His Holiness and for Msgr Cristaldi, who obtained this favor for us. You will gain the Indulgences of Rome, without prejudice for the Indulgences of 1826. All right? On those visits, also pray a great deal for me. With esteem, respect and attachment, I am in J.C.
