At the time when we will be seeing each other, I would like you to have for me the price for a few rolls of cloth or sheeting, whatever it is called, to make bed sheets for a pious place in the care of the poor where I am involved. They have sent me urgent letters from Rome and I would like to help this pious work which is so very, very close to my heart. You do not have to bring me samples, because I surely am not capable of judging anything like that. I leave everything up to you; just let me know that you are going about it; I have found other rolls, and it is something quite important. Before concluding the transaction I shall tell you: you can spend just this much. And then we shall find a way of having that material delivered to Rome. I recommend this to your energy and zeal. I so want to be of assistance to the benefit of the poor, more than I do for my own self. They tell me that around Sanseverino they produce these cloths. Everything is left to your good judgment; and I ask you to keep me informed since that pious place is in extreme need for bed sheets. I seize this occasion, also, to renew myself, Camillo, with esteem and respect and with anticipated obligation, as

Here I am sending a response to your letter. On the vigil of the feast of our Lady of Mount Carmel the Mission in Turricchio will commence; immediately after that, the one in Mergo. I have learned nothing more about the situation in Fiastra. I know that there were legal disputes; but with regard to the Mission, I have had no further information. Fr. Lunerti, if I have not mistaken his name, said that they might be able to arrange another time. I mention this for

your records. Whatever the decision may eventually be, there is no difficulty in sending workers quickly. In view of our new foundations, God does not fail to provide the society with most virtuous priests, adept for the ministry.

In this regard, I must tell you that the excellent bishop of Fuligno, in love with our Institute, has presented me with a gift, so to speak, of an outstanding young Canon from Spello who served as an assistant during the recent Missions. Since he is endowed with particular gifts, I would like to help him advance to the point of giving the main sermons. In the meantime, prayers. This young man is still not a confessor. I shall quickly take him along with me to Pievevitorina, and, in full consultation with Monsignor Lucchesi, I would like you to authorize me to appoint him, in the meantime, as confessor for men as soon as you have received from us all the necessary regulations that we lay down for hearing confessions, and he has studied in our conferences the rules of morality, etc. This fine, young man came from Spello to make a retreat in Pievevitorina, gave one or the other pep talks in the Oratory, and, with pleasure, all recognized in him something that one day will be useful to the benefit of souls and the most lovable mercy of God.

I am very contented with these residences for the spiritual exercises. I assure you that I am consoled to the point of tears. Praise be given to God. When the House in Belforte is opened, I shall be there for a short time, setting up the system to be observed for the greater glory of God. You must assist in the execution of this project. You know so well the need there is for spiritual help among those people where confessors are so scarce. God will reveal his will. So, I just keep on saying: "Our society is from God; he will look after it".

Now we come to our most worthy Canon Betti. If it pleases God (which we shall see) that something can be worked out in regard to releasing him from his Canonry, this would indeed give him more freedom to work in the ministry. One should not take a single step, as is correct, without your approval. For, even if he were released, you will want him appointed to Sanginesio ... *quod Domino placet fiat*.<sup>2</sup> In this regard, I will also say: "God will see to giving us a compensation". Thus, I must open up my heart to you. Since many other pastors are cooperating with the society, I would like you to give a word of encouragement to Fr. Ugo Horgiani, or to some other capable man, to go along with all of these plans of divine providence. If I urge someone, it can be interpreted as my own personal desire to build up the society; but, when the bishops support us by giving us a capable man, then the structure is given greater stability and value. After all, Fr. Ugo Borgiani is neither a Curate nor a Canon; but we are always in a state of indecision. Finally, I would like to count on someone from your archdiocese as I envision new foundations. In this way, the welfare of the various places is taken care of and the good work of the Reform, in which we must all cooperate, is done. Pray ceaselessly for and, most reverend excellency, consider me always ready to carry out your every wish, as I renew myself with esteem, respect and most special affection,

Dear Canon

I do not know what to say about the matter you mentioned. I am afraid, however, that Fr. Giattini is not sufficiently energetic for this work. I am acquainted with such situations. As soon as a Procurator General in Rome urges it, he will obtain what he wishes. That is how it generally happens. I am not saying that I want him to leave the institute there, but in this matter I must confess the truth and I find that he is languid. We simply do not know the ways of God. Adhering to the means which prudence suggests, it seems to me that we must leave it to the divine good pleasure. I assure you that, since I am far from Rome, I am not able to do any more than what has been arranged already and the paper that I sent to the bishop was as clear as the noonday sun. I repeat, Monsignor Lucchesi is very, very honest, and I have known him for quite a long time. He will receive illumination from God to straighten out this affair. At any rate, I am not losing hope. You are to see that the Procurator gets as many letters as are necessary from anyone who is anxious to have the Liguorini remain, especially since I would like to see that too. That organization is quite close to my heart for Spello. Those letters could stimulate the Procurator to present to the Holy Father the situation as it presently exists. The difficulty of the locale should never stand in the way of the good to be done for souls. You might, at least, suggest to the good pastor the holding of a retreat, because, dear me, how important it is that all become saints.

Let us now turn to our appointments. The other day, Prior Santinelli sent me a response and asked me to begin the Mission at the beginning of August and not at the time established. I have already answered him that this is impossible for me and that now everything has been arranged. I cannot tell you how important it is to maintain lettercorrespondence with regard to Missions. I added that if things were not worked out as I had indicated at that time for the work this year, I would no longer be able to make that trip, since all of my appointments have been arranged already for Umbria. Finally, I said that I would make a reasonable settlement with the coachman. I am convinced, therefore, that my letter confirmed the appointments already made.

Keep close to your heart the Constitutions for the S. Xavier group, and the bishop of Fabriano could see that they are brought to light soon, since the Confraternity in Cereto is very, very dear to me. God will manifest his will. Pray for me, and with particular esteem, I am

Venerable Monsignor

On Friday night I shall be in Pievetorina to start on Saturday morning the Mission in Turrichio which is replacing the one in Fiastra, then to be followed by the one in Mergo. However, yesterday I received a letter from the Prior in which he was asking me to defer it to around the 5th of August. As far as I am concerned, God knows how much I would like to content everyone, but with things being so tight now, it is impossible for me. Please note that before setting the date, there was a preceding exchange of letters. Having used all the necessary procedures, I do not know what to say now. I hope that my answer in regard to those dates has convinced the Prior. I cannot tell you how important that correspondence dealing with

appointments for Missions is. So, *patientia, opus perfectum habet*.<sup>6</sup> I shall send a reply to the Vicar, Salvatori, who wrote to me about the matter, telling him whatever you say. So often there are fears and misunderstandings. I shall also write to Prior Cavoni asking him to tell the representative from Belforte to arrange a meeting with you.

As for me, there is nothing more that I can do now except to recommend the whole matter to God. I wrote with great urgency to Monsignor Cristaldi. Now that he is the Treasurer, any word from him would be most influential to bring everything to a conclusion. As I see it, after having understood the mind of the Holy Father with regard to our society, there is nothing more needful to be done with every bit of energy than that of setting up those Houses for Missions and Retreats. If people return into the arms of God's mercy, all else will easily fall into place. Once consciences are set right, so too will all problems find a solution. I compassionate with you in the burden that you have with your worries, and I beg God that whatever you do will be accompanied with a copious supply of blessings.

I am thoroughly pleased that the bishop does not get involved in the litigations which are now pending with respect to the legacy of the good Zampetti of Sarnano. Merely as a point of counsel, I had suggested one idea regarding the doubt that perhaps the inheritance might end up in lay hands (if, indeed, I am not misled), namely, that having an opportune meeting might well produce a certain spiritual good for the people there. Whatever the situation may be, you are better acquainted than I with the state of things and hence can form a judgment that I would never be able to make. God knows what my aims are in speaking or writing about these things.

Take care of yourself; pray for me, and, venerable Monsignor, while kissing your hands, consider me to be

Oh, how consoled I was with the good that has been done in Sonnino! These dioceses will always have the most extensive blessings from God because they have such a great advocate in heaven. He was ready for Paradise and so God called him to himself. But I, who am a bitter piece of fruit, am still maturing on the plant.

How did the Mission in Bassiano, which is so dear to my heart, turn out and when will those souls have the benefit of this good work? I, indeed, suggested my plan so that the people would soon be invited to join the Reform, and souls would be cleansed in the Blood of Jesus Christ. With regard to the women of Bologna, we offer prayers in the meantime.

The Collegio and the Monastery there are very close to my heart, and since I am distant from there, address yourself to Monsignor Caprano and also, if you have the opportunity, use the services of Cardinal Ercolani since he continually sees Monsignor Cristaldi.

I am delighted to learn what you have mentioned concerning the gravestone, but why did you not make a copy of it for me? This is a failing. Oh, how I would read with joy a copy that would be something most dear to me.

Look after the matter of aggregation in Sermoneta; then, we shall think about S. Felice. As a matter of fact, you can count on a *zecchino* for that purpose. You and the bishop think about the rest of the six *scudi*; handle this also. I love very much the persons who have cultivated this tender devotion during the past Mission. You know very well that our common father wanted it to be observed in every place throughout the diocese, so, keep this in mind. About this, tell Muccioli that he can count on receiving a *zecchino* from me. As soon as I set word, I shall settle the payment with him.

My return should occur around the usual time, but I am not able now to give you a specific day. Tell the most reverend bishop that he should make known his ideas in a letter addressed to me in Pievetorina, and I will send him my reply. I will do whatever I can. So very dear to me is the remembrance of my most beloved father in Christ, *cuius memoria in benedictione*.<sup>8</sup> Also very dear to me is the most reverend Manassi, whose hands you will kiss for me. Prayers, *sine intermissione*,<sup>9</sup> for one who wholeheartedly renews himself as

Most illustrious Camillo

Here I am again inconveniencing you, but then I am also increasing your merits for heaven. On Sunday, August 6th, the papal blessing will be given here in Mergo. On the evening of that same Sunday, Fr. Biagio Valentini and Fr. Giovanni Scipioni will be staying overnight in Cereto. I ask you to find lodging for them, paying for the expenses that occur. For Monday, *summo mane*,<sup>12</sup> you are to see that a coach for two is ready for these two men who must absolutely go as fast as possible to Camerino. Make the contract with the coachman from Cereto to the Capuchins' place in Camerino and no farther. That is all that is needed for these two companions. Arriving there by the evening, they can immediately give the pep talks and take care of the Oratory.

Now for me. Please send a twoman cart, like the one that we had coming from Pievevitorina, to me in Serrasanquirico so that on Monday evening, the 7th of August, we can be in Fabriano. And if we get there in time, we will have the Oratory. You are to alert the bishop, *ad cautelam*.<sup>13</sup> If the Rector Cinotti would have room, we would be able to lodge in the seminary, with you supplying him with the payments, as I suggested before. There, you will have ready for us a large coach so that on Tuesday morning, *summo mane*,<sup>14</sup> we can leave so as to be in Fuligno by evening. We would also load onto it our baggage unless it would be more economical to rent a small cart in Fabriano, and for us a twoman cart. I leave all to your good judgment. Otherwise, we will take the large coach. Note that it will be myself and a companion, and he, Giovanni, would ride with the coach driver. If there are other places open, they could be sold, in order to cut down expenses, to upright people. So, you do what you think is best. Women are absolutely excluded, as also Jews, and other suspicious individuals. In those cases, the coach must be reserved only for us. You try to find the most economical ways that can be worked out as you see possible.

It seems that I have nothing more to add now. Inform the most reverend bishop, whom you will greet for me and Fr. Giovanni etc., that Fr. Serafino is always ready for Missions that he would like to entrust to him.<sup>15</sup> Prayers for me. Anxious to receive your reply, with particular

A couple of lines in a hurry. I would like you to write a letter to Fr. Ugo Borgiani, with whom I have been in contact, wishing to have your approval, and authorize him to assist in the training of clerics in Mergo. In general, they show signs of having good qualities, and it is not possible for Fr. Luigi Mariotti to tend to their advancement in virtue and spirit. It is true that their care was assigned to the teacher, as I have been told, but he simply cannot do it. Consequently, I feel that *ad mentem*<sup>17</sup> it should be Fr. Ugo, who voluntarily agrees to do this, etc. In the letter that you send to him, urge him to look after the Oratory which is the bastion against hell, *et de hoc satis*.<sup>18</sup>

This same Fr. Ugo is, as usual, not decided about the rest; in the meantime, he will look after the pious organizations. So, you do what you feel is best.

As for the Lenten preaching in Mergo, if you wish, I shall appoint in time Fr. Luigi Mariotti so that he can prepare himself. Since he is a young man, he should have a strong influence for good on the people there. The Prior, too, will be happy about this. God will inspire you to do what is to his greater glory. I kiss your hands. With esteem, and a most special

On August 30th, send four riding horses and four packanimals at an opportune hour so that we will be able to make our entry into your parish around the hour of twentytwo and a half. On that occasion, you will see to it that the men are separated from the women, and that the latter march under the banner of the Madonna, carried by one of the women. The men, dressed in their uniforms, will precede the rest of the people. Also, you are to see that the principal priest of the town, whomever you deem most appropriate, dressed in surplice and stole, should be there for the beginning of the procession bearing a Crucifix in his hands. He will turn that over to the Missionaries and by this act signify that he intends to consign to them the souls that are entrusted

to his care. Also, the bells are to be rung at the time of the entry and during the procession until all arrive at the Church. There, after the Missionaries have knelt in adoration of the most Blessed Sacrament preserved in the sacred ciborium and having venerated the exposed relic of most holy Mary or some other miraculous image of her, if there is one, the holy Mission will begin with the customary introduction in which the people will be instructed in the method that will be observed during the course of those days. I give you this information, adding only that there will be three Missionaries involved, as well as a young helper that I will bring along. With the usual feeling of esteem, I am

Even though Fr. Biagio Valentini has assumed the task of assisting the Oratory of Spello from Pievetorina by giving it a certain amount of direction, nevertheless you are not to relax it in any case. The clarifications that you will receive shortly will make everything clear and evident.

The particular reason for this letter of mine is to inform you that they have written to me from Rome saying that they have received the papers for Fiammenga in good order and the aggregation has been issued by the Pious Union under the title of the most Precious Blood. It is necessary therefore to make new documents, following the directions set down by Canon Cavalieri, whom you will greet in my name. Send all of this to Rome, and at the same time pay the six scudi that are requested as I mentioned before. Send everything directly to Canon Don Gregorio Muccioli, President of the Archconfraternity of the most Precious Blood, in S. Nicola in Carcere. This is all that I have to communicate to you at this time.

Generally speaking, I am content with the condition of the pious works in other places in the diocese, but, in Camerino... it strikes me as a desolate case and I am pained to see that those means of piety are forgotten in a place where there is so much need. Her long and painful sickness surely must have spared her the fires of Purgatory, and now must be enjoying the fruits of her patience.

Now, it is up to us to prepare ourselves for eternity. For everything here on this earth is but fleeting and transitory.

I wrote a lot of things in other letters of mine that you have received, so I will not repeat them now. I wish to inform you only that when this summer is over Canon Betti will be returning

to his home town, as he has wished. If God will bless the efforts made to get him released from his Canonry, he will be an instrument for the glory of the Lord and for the work of giving Retreats and Missions, as well as for the pious organizations of Sanginesio. Indeed, I assure you that God wants him in the calling that he has undertaken. You will see that in practice. No one will depart from your advice and your wishes. Note that already for some time, now, the climate of Sanginesio has not been beneficial for him. On the other hand, when he is in the Mission Houses and when he is exercising the ministry, he is always in good health. I am firmly convinced that what happened was that I received a special grace obtained for me by the Venerable, for, as I said before, I was incapable of saying all that". Merlini is excellent. If those making the retreat are to remain content, you see to it. Moscatelli will do what you were supposed to do. You will be free to take care of the business needs. Merlini will also serve as the Director and will do the reading at table, too. Moscatelli will assist with the recreation. In this way, everything will be done with an orderly fashion.

I am sending you two copies of the prayers for the oratory; see that one goes to Morcicchia and the other to Colle del Marchese; also, two copies of the Chaplet for those same places.

The Vicar General has indicated that five *ordinandi in sacris*<sup>31</sup> will be there in Giano for a retreat before the Ember Days. I will think about the man who is to give it. We still have time. The Mission at Cannara should be finished by the time of that retreat, and perhaps I will decide on C. Betti. Maybe some priest might want to join the group and make a Retreat. In that case, we could make it a Clergy Retreat. When Bonanni comes, we can ask him whether he wants to give it, unless his appointment as Bishop comes to naught.

I add likewise that I consider Mosconi quite weak in his preaching ability; but, that is no great problem for us. Perhaps I am mistaken.

also required if ever Fr. Scipioni or Fr. Angelo Primavera should come. Fr. Rafaele's room, for I feel that he is quite content in Pievetorina and hence will not be concerned about the other place. Then, you can give your room to the new man. As for Fr. Mariotti, give him the one that is already prepared for Liparelli.

I am writing to Fr. Moscatelli, upon whom for the present I can count only for the trip to Loreto, unless he would want to go to Oriolo which would be a better jaunt. I am leaving him free in the matter because if he doesn't go, I have already made other provisions. Mosconi would like to go, if Bonanni, to whom I have written, permits him to do so. In that case, the archpriest would be very satisfied, for he is expecting to have four Missionaries.

We will not consider him bound to the exact observance of the Rule, and, therefore we can accommodate the Bishop who will know how to act in the future, but who now is very happy to have Bonanni. In this way, too, no matter when he gets the word to report to Rome, he can do so easily from here.<sup>39</sup> Porteria would take him too far afield.

How pleased I am to see your handwriting often and how much I love you for the concern that you show for that Pious House. I have already written you about the transfer of Brother Agostino. All will go along in a normal fashion. You will see him shortly.

I am sorry to hear about the hastiness of the good Achille in the Society. Patience. When Merlini returns, he will bring some books. I hope that Mosconi, when he leaves for Pievetorina, will send some of his clothing which could be of help. Perhaps Mariotti, at his convenience, will be able to rescue some of his clothing from Apiro. God will not fail to assist us. The more hopeless human means appear to us, so much more does confidence in God increase. God will take care of things.

I agree that you should make a trip home. Your will is my will. I am quite trustful of your good judgment.

Tonight, I shall bring the message to Msgr. Santelli. The "*streccino*" perhaps belongs to Fr. Biagio.<sup>47</sup> There will be time to talk about it. Do not send it at all. Do not forget Canon Muti's book of Masses and whatever else you can recall.

Canon Fr. Michele Perucchini will handle the carrying of the Crucifix.

My folks at home thank you for your remembrance and they revere you for it.

However, I am not forgetful of what you expressed about yourself. Try to continue training step by step, so to speak, the good Canon Mariotti. For, if we get a House, who knows, perhaps we might have to come together in the House at Albano. Prayers, and for the time being, silence. Progress zealously in your position as Economist and you will be doing a great good, have no doubt about it. Move into Fr. Rafaele's room, since we have already agreed that he will remain as Director of the Retreats in Pievetorina. Merlini will come there to Giano.

In order to save expenses, I shall take Mosconi and Merlini to Subiaco. Then, immediately they will return, one to Giano, the other to Pievetorina. A new man will be going to Pievetorina within a short time. They are needful of a larger number. I recommend the observance of the rule. I shall take Mariotti with me on other occasions. Tell him, however, that he should write to me whenever he finds the opportunity and assure him of my wholehearted interest in him, as I have for all the others, *sine exceptione*.<sup>48</sup>

This year, in view of the fact that Fr. Luigi Achille has had to supply many things that were his own, and, with the desire to extinguish the debts, I am asking you to make it known to the Gonfalonier and others that the celebration of the feast of S. Felice will be only a spiritual one. Since we have those debts, it is not at all feasible to incur more expenses for a big meal. The desire which the Priests and the people have manifested to me to see the Society firmly established justifies this decision of mine. Hence, this is something that is called for by the circumstances and is not a judgment of free choice.

Take care of yourself. *Ora, jube, vale*.<sup>49</sup> I am in the Heart of J.C. Crucified.

I have been told that the good Tarulli is ill. Sig. Possenti has probably sent you the eight *Sc*. If you should find the bill for the cloth and colored material, send it to me. Msgr. Cristaldi would like to have immediately a copy of the rescript for S. Felice; send it to me by the current mail delivery.

In bringing to a close the present concerns about the Rocca in Spoleto, I am sending a number of memoranda for Fr. Camillo Lepari. I recommend all of them in general and in particular to your kindness, begging you furthermore to bring about a lessening of punishment for those men condemned to a more serious sentence, so that they, too, proportionately, will be able to enjoy the benefits issued by the Pope, intended for the relief of those who are sentenced to life imprisonment. Whatever lessening that can be obtained will be forever beneficial for those unfortunate individuals.

Hoping that it will not be too great an inconvenience for you, I would ask you to read a few letters that I am enclosing. I thought that this would be a better way of handling this matter, so that you could get a clearer picture of what is going on, and thus place you in a better position to promote an investigation of the more worthy cases, weighing everything *in pondere et*

*mensura*.<sup>52</sup> I really do not know whether I am doing wrong in forcing you like this.

The news that I get concerning the perseverance in good shown by those poor prisoners is most consoling. So, I am encouraged to look after the relief that they are asking for. God will reward your most reverend excellency a hundredfold for so much good that you do for the greater glory of the Lord.

What will you say of me, my Monsignor, for bothering you so frequently? Well, I just have to say this. Everyone knows, also because of Canon Muccioli, that you are the protector of the Missions and that you are zealously behind the Reform etc. etc., and because of that, so very, very many people are bold enough to have recourse to us. God knows how willingly I involve myself in such undertakings and how earnestly I desire a total success in it. If I were to refuse to do this, as I exercise my ministry, I would prejudice the glory of God. I felt that I had to make this observation so that you will realize the source from which my importune actions arise. I am consoled to know that you are endowed with a generous heart and that you try to the best of your abilities to be a comfort especially to the poor. This thought brings me calm.

Keep close to your heart the petition that I sent you for the Holy Father in behalf of Canon Betti Severini. I would appreciate receiving the *pro gratia*<sup>53</sup> as quickly as possible.

The warden of the Rocca will be forwarding a petition to you, asking to be moved to Rome. Receive it kindly, and even now I recommend it to your good judgment and discretion.

Take good care of your health. May the Lord preserve you for many long years. So, your reverend excellency, full of esteem and very special affection, I am in Jesus Christ

I was very pleased to receive your letter of the 24th and I thank God for your fine sentiments. May the Lord make you holier as each day goes by. You are to do as follows. Send a petition to Monsignor Cristaldi who, I hear, will be in Fuligno within a short time. Present yourself to him there and, having confided to him the secret, which is the very heart of this situation, insist again, in my name, on the patrimony. Later you can tell me the outcome. Enclosed are the petitions that we have been discussing, and I recommend them to your charity.

Among the priests who are to be nominated, one, perhaps, should come from Umbria. More, when we speak in person, since the procedure has already been set.

In passing through Spoleto, insist on the backpayments for Giano, since the most reverend Delegate and the Vicar Apostolic are aware of all of the concerns. I know that the schools, so to speak, are insolvent, but at least we must not surrender our rights. I have already stated that I would be content with ten *scudi* per year during the time when the schools are incapable, as long as ultimately this entire matter can be settled. Upon your return to Rome, you will find the rescript relative to what I am speaking of here, and you will return that to me in Giano. I realize well that the schools in Spoleto will have to set up some sort of plan in order to recover, and I surely desire full success for them because that is all well and good, but never to the disadvantage of S. Felice to which all the buildings of that area belonged. I am attempting to defend what is the property of the Church, and the rescript that was issued was entirely the result of the work put forth by your excellency and the wonderful lawyer Paolucci, *cuius memoria in benedictione*.<sup>64</sup> The House in Giano does have debts in view of the situation of having to put the place in order, proportionate to the most urgent needs, and this was done based on the funds that would come from those backpayments.

If my engagement at present of giving the retreat to the nuns of the Divino Amore does
